





<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Muslims believe that the world would not function without Allah (God).</li> <li>Muslims never draw Allah</li> <li>The Shahadah is one of the Five Pillars of Islam and to be a Muslim, you must believe and declare these words.</li> <li>Muslims have 99 names for Allah.</li> </ul>	<div style="text-align: center;">  </div> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Muslims believe the Qur'an is God's final message to humanity, revealed to the Prophet Muhammad.</li> <li>Muslims pray to worship God, because he is Creator and has no equals</li> <li>Ritual prayer is known as Salah in Arabic and is a form of worship</li> <li>Not all Muslims pray 5 times a day. Many will perform du'a (personal prayer) at any time of the day (There is diversity within Muslim practice).</li> <li>Fasting helps Muslims to appreciate how poor people suffer and to concentrate the mind on what it means to be a Muslim/obey commands of Allah.</li> <li>Festival of Eid-ul-Fitr is a day of celebration, happiness and forgiveness at the end of Ramadan. It is believed to help Muslims move closer to God.</li> </ul>	<table border="1"> <tr> <td>Eid al-Fitr</td> <td>The Muslim festival marking the end of the fast of Ramadan</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Ibadah</td> <td>Worship. This is one of the Five Pillars.</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Mosque</td> <td>A special/holy place for Muslims—where they come together to pray and worship God (Allah)</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Rak'ahs</td> <td>Prayer positions.
